Mr. Morgan stated we requested an additional \$100,000 for seasonal wages in the 2020 budget and the Board of Commissioners approved the request. Mr. Morgan stated we can advertise the higher rates for the winter season to attract more applicants. Ms. Pawar asked if these rates are comparable with other park agencies. Mr. Morgan stated we compared with Meridian Township, City of Lansing, and local park departments, and we are paying either the equivalent or more to be competitive.

City of Lansing Millage Agreement Modification ~

Mr. Kaschinske stated the City of Lansing has three projects that came in over bid. They had two bidders and the bids were significantly more than what was expected. Ms. Gregg asked which round of the millage were these projects from, and Ms. Moore stated round one and probably round three.

Commissioner Stivers asked why the bids were over by so much. Mr. Kaschinske stated it was estimated low and their design consultant didn't catch this either. It wasn't until the projects were bid, that they found out the costs were higher than anticipated. Commissioner Stivers asked why the estimates were initially so far off. Mr. Kaschinske said endangered species caused additional permitting with DEQ and the area expanded. If the consultant who did the analysis, would have taken this to their other teams around the state, they would have probably caught it would need more money before they went out to bid. Ms. Moore stated these projects are three years old, so the estimates were done years ago. Mr. Kaschinske stated in general bids are coming in much higher too.

Commissioner Trubac asked which species are endangered. Mr. Kaschinske stated slipper shell mussels. Commissioner Trubac asked for more details about the mussels. Mr. Kaschinske said if you find these animals you have to relocate them to another area. You have a scuba team scouring the water for these mussels. Ms. Thomas asked which projects the endangered species affected. Mr. Kaschinske said the Moores Park project is the only one that didn't have the mussels, and the other projects did. Commissioner Stivers said that is the opposite of the letter. Mr. Kaschinske clarified it was all but the Moores River project that had the mussels. Commissioner Stivers asked for corrected letter before it was presented to the Board of Commissioners. Ms. Pawar asked for clarification if the DEQ permits is the only reason for increased costs. Mr. Kaschinske said it was also the construction cost going up, not estimating properly on the original application, and not having the consultant flag that before going out to bid.

Ms. Buzzard stated the original amount of the projects for TR001 was \$419,663, TR006 was \$368,160 and TR029 was \$100,000. Mr. Bennett asked if the City had included a match in the new request. Mr. Kaschinske said they did not provide any match money. Mr. Morgan stated round one did not require a match. Mr. Bennett stated if we recommend this to the Board of Commissioners, he would suggest a friendly amendment to the motion to require the same percent match from the City of Lansing's original application. Ms. Gregg stated it was a high priority to provide a match in the 2017 round. Mr. Pratt asked who the consultant was for the projects. Mr. Kaschinske said NTH.

Ms. Buzzard asked if this is a precedent going forward. Commissioner Stivers said Meridian Township submitted changes for projects previously, and they moved around money for the projects. If you implement it at the match for an original rate, that could get sticky.

Commissioner Stivers asked if they could shuffle money for other projects. Mr. Kaschinske said he would have to look into this.

Dear Chairperson Crenshaw, Ms. Buzzard and Mr. Morgan:

The City has been entrusted with grant funds from Ingham County and I want to ensure the City is being a wise steward of millage dollars and performing our due diligence for long-term repair to prevent further deterioration and provide a safe regional River Trail.

The purpose of this letter is to request an increase in our budget for the following projects Grand River North Section (TR-029), Moore River Drive Trail (TR-006), and overlay and reconstruction (TR001). The city is asking for additional funding over the awarded grant amounts to encompass the additional costs of the projects, which is estimated to be \$830,735. This amount is due to number of unforeseen circumstances related to the projects. There were additional DEQ permits and the threat to endangered aquatic species on the Moores River Drive project resulting in delays and further research studies. There were severe issues involving all of the projects along the riverbank that resulted in significant changes and additional costs for bank stabilization.

The additional funds requested for each project are as follows: TR001 \$291,465, TR-006 \$312,325 and TR-029 \$226,945.

I understand the request for additional funds is substantial; however, I do believe the funds are being used appropriately. While the extra work was unforeseen, I do see it as a necessity to provide a secure trail to safeguard the public and avoid deterioration in the near future.

Thank you for your consideration and I look forward to hearing from you should you have any questions or if I may provide any additional information.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Composting Options for Weeds Harvested from Lake Lansing ~

Younes Ishraidi stated there is a Special Assessment District who manages Lake Lansing. The assessment is paid by property owners, and the County and Township pays \$10,000. The Assessment District bids out contracts for harvesting and herbicide. Curt Armbruster is proposing the County dispose of the material from harvesting since there is no easy place to dispose of that material. The thought was maybe there is a site that the County could accept that material, or consider some compositing site. Mr. Ishraidi asked if the County has a facility.

Ms. Gregg asked what the volume is of the material. Mr. Ishraidi said it varies, on average they harvest 30 acres, and volume wise he would estimate 300 cubic yards of material, or 25 large truck loads on the high end. Commissioner Stivers said we used to have an agreement with the Food Bank for this, and they ended that program. Is the County interested in a composting program, if not, do we have any ideas of who else may be interested? Commissioner Stivers stated Hammond Farms may be interested.

Mr. Bennett stated he is concerned about other pond weeds, would they have seeds, would you be reintroducing that to other areas and spreading it even further? Mr. Swope said they also use chemical treatments. Mr. Ishraidi said you are not supposed to harvest milfoil. Commissioner Stivers said she was told it was harvested. Mr. Ishraidi said you are not supposed to harvest it.

Commissioner Stivers said there was a special machine to pull it out by the roots and have done so for years, but haven't done that in many years. Mr. Ishraidi said he is pretty certain it is not milfoil, and there are strict regulations on milfoil. Commissioner Stivers said this is the opposite of everything she has been told. Mr. Ishraidi said he can speak with Commissioner Stivers about this more in detail.

Ms. Gregg stated composting this properly and this volume seems like a commercial endeavor; and we don't have the capacity for this. Mr. Swope stated he is concerned about residual herbicides, and this is not a program the County should pick up without more research. Ms. Gregg stated MSU has an anaerobic digester and they might be interested in this. Mr. Bennett stated at this point, the consensus of the group is we are not interested in this.



Phase IIb of the MSU to Lake Lansing Connector Trail will consist of creating 0.5 miles of 10-foot wide concrete Shared Use Path by adding three feet to the existing seven foot wide concrete pathway. This project will upgrade the pathway to meet current MDOT and AASHTO specifications for width, and correct a number of localized drainage issues.


Once completed, the trail system will connect with Phase II of the project to the west and with the new Okemos Road Boardwalk to the south. This will provide surrounding residential neighborhoods with access to several Meridian Township facilities and parks. Along with providing the community with a expanded recreational pathway system, this project will increase non-motorized transportation opportunities between residential areas and the commercial districts to the south and east.

The entire MSU to Lake Lansing trail system, including this project, has been identified by Ingham County as a Regional Corridor and will be one of the main lines of the county wide Regional Trail Network. As part of a Comprehensive Report put together by Ingham County, polling was conducted to identify support amongst regional stakeholders for individual projects. This project was identified as the top priority in the county, garnering 36% more interest than the next leading trail.

East Lansing Northern Tier Trail Connection

Created by: Michael Hayward Meridian Township DPW 10/22/19

In a brief narrative:

The East Lansing Northern Tier Connection will be approximately 0.6 miles of 10 foot wide Shared Use Path. Once completed, the trail will close the final gap in the Northern Trail loop, providing many single-family residential units with access to a non-motorized mode of transportation. This pathway allows access to numerous Meridian Township facilities and parks, and will further expand and improve the recreational opportunities available to everyone in the area. Furthermore, this will provide safe transportation for parents and their children to access the elementary school to the south.







Public Demand



This project is of joint interest between Meridian Township and East Lansing, and is identified on the non-motorized plan of both communities. Furthermore, this route is already in use by local pedestrians and cyclists who wish to utilize the larger surrounding trail network and are willing to go out into the road despite the gap in the non-motorized pathway.

Payment of Project

The total cost for the of the East Lansing Northern Tier Trail Connection is estimated to be approximately \$500,000. Along with funds provided by Ingham County Trail Millage Fund, this system is locally funded by the Charter Township of Meridian Fund.



Leslie Township

Leslie Township Park Trail









The trail path is entirely under public ownership, the Township of Leslie.









This mix of walking trail, ball fields, children's playground and gathering place has been observed to enhance other area township grounds with it's use by young families with children of all ages, as well as older residents walking and running for health.

The trail path is entirely under public ownership, the Township of Leslie. The project is an eight foot wide, 3" thick asphalt walking and running trail 1/3 of a mile long. The trail will encircle the ball field area at the Leslie Township Grounds



The Leslie Township Hall was built in 1986. In the intervening 33 years the grounds have expanded to include two ball fields, a pavilion, and a children's playground. **The Townships Boards** have since contributed to the Pavilion Fund to improve the Township grounds for the enjoyment and welfare of their citizens. Money was earmarked for this project in the township 2019-2020 budget.

The trail also follows partially alongside a meadow and wet area for wildlife observation.

The trail will add about \$700 per year to our maintenance costs which will be budgeted.





East Side

There are currently no paved public trails (except sidewalks) in the Leslie area so this trail will fill a need in the area. To date granting of the Ingham County Trails and Parks millage to the Leslie area has been a \$4,000 grant for trail signage awarded to the City of Leslie.





South Side

The trail will need a top coat of pavement probably in 8-10 years which will need to be saved for at around \$5,000 per year (assuming asphalt prices do not increase, as they haven't compared to 2010 prices) to be put in our Pavilion fund.





South Side

The trail can be safely monitored due to the fact it is in an open area that is easily observable from the rest of the grounds. Part of the trail will also be under surveillance from the township hall security cameras.





West Side

The trail is situated in the middle of our 2400 resident township and is adjacent to the 2000 resident City of Leslie. We open our grounds and trail to all and the facilities are well used.





West Side

Planned are two signs to be placed at the western edge indicating trail details, trail hours open, and rules. This is the area nearest our two parking lots and so they will be conveniently seen before use.








We have determined that no engineering for this project is required as:

- The trail is being built on a fairly level, well drained sandy loam(see Attachment 4).
- The paving contractor has paved similar trails in the area with good results using the method described above. Following is a comparison of our well drained soil vs the White Oak Township trail put in on a poorly drained soil without gravel foundation eight years ago. As you will see it has held up adequately and should last 10 years, at which time it will receive an overcoat of asphalt.











Lake Lansing Park South Gardens (Mid-Michigan Master Gardener Volunteer Project) Story by project leader Laurie Kaufman (lkaufman@msu.edu)

Mid-Michigan Stewardship Initiative members Laurie Kaufman, Leslie Kuhn, and Jim Hewitt worked with staff at Ingham County's Lake Lansing Park South to design, fund, and create two demonstration gardens.

Our goal was to establish two gardens at Lake Lansing Park South that:

- Engaged youth in learning about native plants
- Provided community members with an opportunity to take pride in developing & maintaining a public garden
- Served as beautiful and prominent community demonstration gardens for butterfly, bee, and bird-friendly gardening using native Michigan plants
- Provided a friendly way for the public to learn about the direct connection between storm water runoff, erosion, and water quality
- Demonstrated to visitors how they can make a difference through planting a rain garden and/or shoreline buffer zone on their own property.

Lake Lansing (Haslett, MI) is entirely fed by storm water runoff, making it especially susceptible to pollution from fertilizers and contaminants from watercraft and roadways. Shoreline erosion from wave action and ice push also negatively impact water quality in Lake Lansing by addition of sediments containing nutrients and pollutants.

Native Plant Rain Garden

In 2011, the Wildflower Association of Michigan / Glassen Educational Grant Program supported the development of a 500 square-foot demonstration rain garden comprised of butterfly and bee friendly native wildflowers and shrubs at Lake Lansing South Park.

Rain garden site preparation and planting was done by $4^{th} - 7^{th}$ graders from the Navy League Cadet Corps under the supervision of Ingham County Parks Stewardship Coordinator Nicholas Sanchez and Mid-Michigan Stewardship Initiative members. The rain garden offered

these students an opportunity to establish a garden from the ground up while learning about native plants and water quality issues.

This was followed in 2012 by the creation of a 700 square-foot **Shoreline Buffer Demonstration Garden** featuring many native plants. Local garden clubs donated plants and helped fund plant purchases, and community volunteers helped prepare and plant the site.

Interpretive signs at each garden provide educational outreach for the 125,000 visitors per year, who enjoy the natural beauty of the lakeshore and surrounding wetlands at Lake Lansing Park South.

Both gardens function to intercept and filter contaminated runoff from the parking lot and turf areas, allowing cleaner water to empty into the lake and surrounding wetlands. Sited next to the main entrance, the **native plant rain garden** offers high visibility, and opportunities for public education. The rain garden has become the centerpiece for Lake-Friendly Landscaping Workshops, and it has hosted visits from nearby Ralya Elementary School students.

Master Gardener volunteers Bonnie Russian, Chris Barnhill, Debra Sutter, Doug VanderJagt, Kelly Treiber, David Gunns, and Eric Wildfang have helped maintain and expand both demonstration gardens at Lake Lansing Park South, while learning about native plants, hydrology, and factors that affect lake water quality.

Why plant a rain garden?

Rain gardens favor wetland plants or those that tolerate seasonal inundation, and they absorb and filter rain and flood water. Rain gardens have taken on new importance with the growing recognition that the impervious surfaces created by humans – roads, parking lots, driveways, and roofs – cover soil that would normally take up water, causing large volumes of runoff. Human-created surfaces often concentrate pollutants, such as petroleum and other chemicals that leak from vehicles and leach from asphalt shingles and road surfaces. The rain garden planted with Michigan native plants at Lake Lansing Park South helps filter parking lot runoff water before it reaches fragile wildlife habitat in the nearby sedge meadow and Lake Lansing. The native plants also provide nectar and pollen for native bees and provide host plants for larvae of butterflies and other beneficial insects.

How does a shoreline plant buffer zone work?

Replacing lawn with native wetland plants at the water's edge can reduce erosion, intercept storm water runoff, and help filter nutrients and pollutants before they enter the lake. A shoreline buffer zone containing deep-rooted perennials plus small shrubs and/or trees can stabilize soils to reduce erosion. A shoreline buffer planting saves lawn maintenance costs (both time and money) and can look attractive while providing ecological benefits (habitat for songbirds, butterflies, and frogs).

Goose droppings provide another source of nutrients and bacteria that can contaminate the water. Geese prefer to feed where turfgrass extends to the water's edge to provide them a clear view of approaching predators. Even shoreline plants 1-2 ft tall may be sufficient to deter geese.

How should I design my shoreline buffer or rain garden?

When designing your shoreline buffer or rain garden, consider whether plants can tolerate prolonged submersion in water or saturated soil during spring flooding or high lake levels. You should choose plant species best suited to thrive under your site conditions. For example, plants such as native iris (but not bearded iris) can withstand periodic flooding as well as dry periods. If your goal is to prevent shoreline erosion, choose a variety of plants with extensive root systems that can intermingle to better stabilize the soil.

Why choose plants native to Michigan or nearby states?

Native ecosystems typically include a diversity of plant species that provide pollinators with food sources from early spring through late fall.

Pollinators are essential for production of our food and for production of seeds, fruits, and berries that are consumed by birds and other wildlife. Even garden-worthy non-native plants may not provide the right nutrients for native butterflies, bees, and beneficial insects (i.e. Monarch butterfly larvae can only survive on milkweed species). Because native insects and plants have evolved together, native insects typically don't defoliate native plants (Tallamy, 2007).

Insects sustain the natural food chain. If your garden provides no native plants, there may not be enough insects to support songbirds and their offspring (insect larvae are an important food source for newborn birds). Including some native plants in your landscape design insures that your garden can offer the "ecosystem services" that support beneficial insects and the rest of the food chain that depends on them.
