PRESENTATION

NACPRO Award

Mr. Morgan stated that there were two awards from NACPRO. One for Spicer Group and one for the Ingham County Parks Department. The award was for the Trails and Corridors – Class I award for the Trail Wayfinding System. Tanya Moore and Cindy Todd accepted the award on behalf for Spicer Group.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Master Plan

Tanya Moore (Spicer Group) stated the survey generated over 2200 responses. Ms. Moore went over the public input summary, goals and objectives and would like the park commission to prioritize the action program (A: Next 4 years, B: 4-10 years, C: +10 years). Prioritization listed below in spreadsheet.

Overview

Ingham County has developed a five-year action plan that will enable it to move toward accomplishing its goals and objectives. The action program details the direction that Ingham County Parks wishes to take over the next five years and beyond. It is established to maintain and improve the quality and diversity of its park and recreation opportunities.

It is important to note the projects and equipment lists below may not be exhaustive. The project list reflects the results of the input received from Ingham County Park staff, the open houses, and the online survey, and is the best reflection of needs at the time this plan was written. Future circumstances, especially availability of funding, may influence the order in which the projects are completed. Other projects may arise that were not able to be anticipated when the plan was written. This action portion of the Master Plan is intended to be reviewed annually by the staff and park commission and updated, as needed, as part of the normal budget process.

Major Capital Projects

Ingham County has identified the Major Capital Projects. They are shown in Table 20. These projects will require professional services assistance for planning, grant writing, and design, and construction oversight and will most likely need to be funded with a dedicated campaign that will include grant funding, millage proceeds, and fundraising. The projects have been prioritized and given a timeline so that the Ingham County Parks Department can look ahead and plan for the orderly development of these facilities. Each project is referenced to a specific goal from the previous section of this document.

RESOLUTION #26-21 RECOMMENDING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONTRACT WITH SCARLETT EXCAVATING

WHEREAS, Scarlett Excavating was contracted to excavate and install a County purchased snowmaking pipe at Hawk Island County Park; and

WHEREAS, during the excavation process, large amounts of concrete and debris were discovered in the area of work dating back to the previous on-site gravel pit operation. The removal and disposal of this concrete was unforeseen and was not included in the original scope of work. Scarlett Excavation also purchased multiple fittings and pipe that was also necessary for the installation.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Ingham County Parks Department recommends an amendment to the contract with Scarlett Excavating for an additional amount of \$10,049.69. These funds are available in 228-75999-976000-20P11.

Crushed Stone Test Path

RESOLUTION #27-21 TO SUPPORT A CONTRACT WITH HEATH MEYER – GENERATION III EXCAVATING FOR INSTALLING AN ACCESSIBLE CRUSHED STONE EXAMPLE PATH AT LAKE LANSING NORTH

Ms. Moore stated that we reduced the scope of work on this project to get the cost down as well it was a different vendor then the first proposal. Mr. Morgan stated that the time frame we are looking at if it gets approved is at least 90 days at best. Ms. Hamrick has concerns with the price and feels that any concerned individuals can go to Hawk Nest to see what it is like. Commission Stivers prefers that people see it at Lake Lansing North and that while we all did a great job at getting the correct information out to people with concerns it would be ideal if they could feel it, push strollers over it and walk their dogs on it at the park they are used to. Commission Stivers stated she is not about wasting money, however this is a legitimate concern for a lot of people. Mr. James stated that we plan on doing the project if we are awarded the grant so he sees it as an investment.

WHEREAS, the Purchasing Department solicited proposals from qualified and experienced contractors for providing and installing a new accessible crushed stone example path at Lake Lansing North Park; and

WHEREAS, after careful review and evaluation of the proposals received, the Evaluation Committee recommends that a contract be awarded to Heath Meyer – Generation III Excavating.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Ingham County Parks & Recreation Commission recommends entering into a contract with Heath Meyer – Generation III Excavating for a total amount not to exceed of \$19,937.30 for a crushed stone accessible example path at Lake Lansing North County Park.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that there is \$19,937.30 available in the Trails and Parks Millage fund balance.

WHEREAS, Board of Commissioners Resolution #21-311 authorized an amendment to the contract with Laux Construction, LLC to extend the contract to October 31, 2021 due to COVID-19 and contractor delays; and

WHEREAS, the Burchfield park improvement project needs additional funding and a time extension due to excavation subcontractor availability.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Ingham County Parks & Recreation Commission supports the amendment to the contract with Laux Construction, LLC to extend the term to June 30, 2022.



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
COMMUNITY DESCRIPTION

REGIONAL CONTEXT

Ingham County is the southeastern most County within the Lansing Tri-County Region, with Eaton County to the west and Clinton County to the northwest. The County is located in the central portion of Michigan's Lower Peninsula, the Tri-County encompass 1,700 square miles, Ingham County counts for 561 of those square miles. In terms of land, 90% of the Tri-County Region is classified as rural or small town. Approximately 85% of Ingham County is rural. The other surrounding counties include Shiawassee to the northeast, Livingston to the east, Washtenaw to the southeast, Jackson to the south, Calhoun to the southwest, and Ionia to the northwest. The major cities within the region are Lansing, Jackson, Ann Arbor, and Battle Creek.


Population statistics indicate that Ingham County has a larger population base than Eaton or Clinton counties. In 2019, the ACS* Data showed that 478,432 people live in the Tri-County region with 290,587 (60.7%) in Ingham County. In 2018, the regional population was 482,269, indicating a decrease in population from 2018 to 2019; in Ingham County the 2018 population was 292,406. The Ingham County population decreased by 1,819 between 2018 and 2019.

Understanding the characteristics of the population being served is helpful when evaluating parks and recreation facilities and their needs. Table 1 provides an analysis of key demographic data for Ingham County as compared to Clinton County, Eaton County, and Michigan.

Ingham County has the largest population of the three Tri-Counties with the largest percentage of younger residents, population under 19 (80.1%), and the smallest over 65 (13.1%). Ingham's median age is 32. The County has the lowest median household value as well as the lowest median household income. There is almost double the number of renters in Ingham County compared to Clinton and Eaton Counties. This data is reflective of Michigan State University being in the County, with a large population of younger residents who rent and have lower incomes.

Ingham County's population is centered in the greater Lansing metropolitan area. Historical growth patterns show that the outskirts of the Lansing area have a smaller population which decreases further from the city center. In recent years, most of the population in the individual municipalities within the County have increased, while only two have decreased. Populations of the individual jurisdictions in Ingham County are shown below in Table 2.

NATURAL RESOURCE INVENTORY

GEOGRAPHIC PROFILE

COUNTY PHYSIOGRAPHY

The soils of Ingham County are a direct result of glacial deposits made between 10,000 and 12,000 years ago. Soil properties very depending on how the materials were deposited.

A key feature of Ingham County is that it contains one of the greatest concentrations of eskers in Michigan. Eskers are sand and gravel deposits of glacial streams that were confined by ice walls and left as ridges after the ice disappeared. The Mason esker extends for more than 35 miles from the Looking Glass River southeast of DeWitt to southeast of Mason. In places, this feature has gravel ridges extending more than 35 feet high, with a trough ranging in width from 200 feet to over onehalf mile. At its northern extension, the esker passes through Bancroft Park in northeast Lansing, where a major portion has been preserved in its original form, and then further along into the west side of Groesbeck Golf Course. Mount Hope Cemetery in Lansing is located on its central section.

Remaining portions of the esker are difficult to follow, due to losses from mining operations or its convergence with other glacial deposits, such as moraines. However, the original deposits that remain are of significant geologic and historic value.

The range in elevation in the County is from 800 to 1,000 feet above sea level. The topography in Ingham County ranges from nearly level to hilly, with a limited number of areas classified as steep.

COUNTY HYDROLOGY

Wetlands cover 19% of the County, with lakes and rivers accounting for 1.2% of that percentage. Lake Lansing, located in the north-central part of the County, is the largest natural lake. Several smaller lakes are located in the southeastern portion of the County, but most of these are surrounded by muck soils. The majority of the land surrounding the existing lakes are privately owned.

Most of Ingham County falls within the Upper Grand River Watershed. The southeast corner is in the Huron River Watershed. The rivers in Ingham County can be considered a significant natural resource, see Map 3 on page 7. The Grand River flows north-south along the western boundary of the County and the Red Cedar River flows east-west across the northern portion of the County into the Grand River. Most of the midsection of the County drains to the north into the Red Cedar River. The northern tier of townships drains southward to the Red Cedar River. The Sycamore Creek, flowing northwest into the Red Cedar River, in Lansing, drains much of the midsection of the County. Most of the southern portion of the County drains south or west into the Grand River. The southeast corner drains southward to the Huron River via the Portage Creek and Portage River and a series of small lakes.

COUNTY VEGETATION

Ingham County lies in the deciduous forest zone in which the climax forest is Beech-Maple or Oak-Hickory. Farming throughout the past century has significantly reduced these original forests. Typical vegetation groupings within the County are agriculture, forest, swamp and marsh, river and lakeshore, and abandoned field.

FNVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

The Ingham County Parks Department is aware of the need to protect endangered and threatened species as well as other unique natural features that may exist within the County. Environmental reviews are completed for any park projects where it is appropriate.

CULTURAL AND MAN-MADE RESOURCES

HISTORIC AREAS

There are several historically significant places within Ingham County. Individual homes and buildings have been designated by local communities as worthy of preservation and have been included in the State historical register.


Of equal value are the unique environments such as the Meridian Township Historical Village. These types of environments offer both learning opportunities and the preservation of historical artifacts and structures.

LAND USE

Trends show that the developments within the County have gradually expanded outward from the Lansing Metropolitan Area. When infrastructure and land use are compared, the more intense land uses are directly associated with transportation, sewer and water services.

TRANSPORTATION NETWORK

ROADS

Ingham County residents are largely dependent on automobiles and public buses for transportation. Other modes are available but play a minor role in moving people. Roads and highways within the County are part of the Regional, State and Local network. The freeways, particularly I-96, I-496 and US-127 are routes leading to destination's outside of Ingham County. Commercial centers are located adjacent to these routes to take advantage of the access. Entrance / exit ramps illustrate where development has occurred in the County.

AIRPORTS AND RAIL

The Capital Region International Airport, located north of Lansing, is the largest in the area. It is a full-service, all-weather, commercial-airline airport, serving the entire Lansing Metropolitan Area. In addition, Jewett Airport in Mason is a small facility which is used by agricultural planes, small clubs and recreational pilots. Amtrak, CSX Transportation, Canadian National Railway and Jail (Jackson & Lansing Rail) all operate in Ingham County.

NON-MOTORIZED TRANSPORTATION

According to MDOT's 2015 University Region Plan, there are over 74 miles of existing and shareduse paths in Ingham County owned and maintained by the local jurisdictions. Another 139 miles of shared-use paths are planned with a total of 360 proposed facilities, (paved shoulders-123, side paths-42, bike lanes-55). Trails and paths in parks accommodate a large portion of the recreational demand. However, urban routes that access the County parks often are not safe due to the lack of continuous connections. Rural routes are limited by the availability of paved shoulders.

In November of 2014, and again in 2020, Ingham County voters passed a 0.5 mill levy for the purpose of creating and maintaining a county-wide system of recreational trails and adjacent park systems. A Trails and Parks Comprehensive Report was completed in early 2016, with an update currently underway, the plan can be viewed at

https://pk.ingham.org/trails_and_parks_millage_millage_comprehensive_report.php to guide future development and expansion of the county-wide regional network of trails (both land and water) and parks.


WATER TRAILS

The State of Michigan has nine State designated water trails, of which two are in Ingham County, the Upper Grand River and Middle Grand River Water Trails. MGROW (Middle Grand River Organization of Watersheds) and UGRWA (Upper Grand River Watershed Alliance) have developed plans to guide the development of safe, sustainable water trails with possible extensions to the Red Cedar River.

The Plan inventories current trail assets along the Grand River, identify opportunities to improve public access, user experience, and provide guidance for navigating the physical and institutional challenges that may be encountered during water trail development or use.

The Red Cedar River meanders through the northern portion of the County touching the cities of Williamston, East Lansing, and downtown Lansing where it meets with the Grand River. There are currently 8 launching sites traversing 23 miles of the river from Williamston to downtown Lansing.

STAFFING / STRUCTURE

This section of the Plan details the administrative structure of the Ingham County Parks system which consists of involvement from Ingham County, the Ingham County Parks Department (ICPD), the Ingham Parks and Recreation Commission, and the Ingham County Board of Commissioners.

This section also includes park staffing, methods of programming, finance, and budget, as well as park related fees and services.

INGHAM COUNTY PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

The Ingham County Parks and Recreation Commission was created under Act 261 of 1965. The Commission meets monthly and consists of the following 10 members:

- 1. Ingham County Drain Commissioner
- 2. Chairperson of the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission, if he/she is a resident of Ingham County; but if he/she is not a resident of Ingham County, then another representative of the Regional Planning Commission who is a resident of Ingham County shall be appointed by 2/3 vote of the Board; and
- 3. Eight members appointed by the Board of Commissioners, not less than one, nor more than three, of whom shall be members of the Board of Commissioners.

EXISTING MANAGEMENT STRUCTURE

For daily operational policy and procedural issues that arise, the Director of Parks reports to the Deputy Controller. The Parks and Recreation Commission recommends policies and procedures related to the day-to-day operation of the parks, consistent with existing County policies. The Director is responsible for coordinating the directives of the County Controller and the Commission. He/she implements the Board of Commissioner-approved acquisition and development plans, making recommendations to the Commission and performing liaison functions between the staff and Commission.

STAFFING

The ICPD operates with 14 permanent positions and multiple seasonal staff. Permanent staff positions that are responsible for the management of the park system are shown in Table 3 on the following page.



VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers play an integral part in the operations and maintenance of Ingham County Park facilities. Volunteers assist with park events and park improvements, and they play an active role in the volunteer committees that support the parks. In 2020, volunteers donated 580 hours of time to the parks. Some of the tasks completed by volunteers include painting, construction assistance, power washing, working to put boats in and pulls boats out of the water, invasive plant species removal, raking, trash pick-up, weeding, and trail maintenance.

The Friends of Ingham County Parks Group has been an active group of committed volunteers who have assisted the ICPD with volunteer coordination, project development and project fundraising. The Friends of Ingham County Parks organized and incorporated in 1999 as a not-for-profit 501(c)3 corporation. Some of the projects they have assisted with are Hawk Island Community Built Playground (2005), Lake Lansing Community Bandshell (2002), Lake Lansing Community Built Playground (1997), Lake Lansing North Land Acquisition (2008), Hawk Island Cabana (2011), Bike Repair Stations (2017), ADA sidewalk entrance at Lake Lansing South (2018), Life Jacket Stations, and grant assistance from projects at the Lake Lansing Boat Launch, Riverbend, Hawk Island, Lake Lansing North, and Burchfield Parks.

BUDGETS & FUNDING

Each year through the budgeting process, the County sets aside a specific dollar amount for each facet of the parks and recreation system within Ingham County. The amount established each year is based largely upon expenditures of past years. The complete revenue and expenditure budget detail for 2021 can be found in Appendix A.

The sources of revenue for Ingham County Parks include:

- General Fund
- Vehicle Entry Fees
- Equipment Rentals (i.e. canoes, boats, snow tubes, skis)
- Facility Rentals (i.e. picnic shelters, band shell, games)
- Food Concessions
- Fees (i.e. Boat Launch, Disc Golf, Dog Park)
- Trails and Parks Millage (described below)
- **Donations**

Other sources of revenue for the County depends on are grants, donations and volunteer labor service from specific recreation users.

The budgeted expenditures for Maintenance and Operations, Capital Improvements, and the Trails and Parks Millage are in the following table.

NOTES ABOUT FEES

The Parks Commission and County Board of Commissioners have passed resolutions to waive fees for Ingham County residents who find the vehicle entrance fee or the boat launch fee a hardship, by requesting the gate attendants to waive the fees with a hardship pass. The County issues about 1,300-1,500 hardship passes annually.

In addition to the vehicle entrance fee hardship pass, the County also has a policy for some small groups and individuals to receive reduced or waived fees, including:

- Seniors, College Students, Veterans, and Owners of Service Animals receive reduced rates at the dog park
- School Groups within Ingham County receive free use of park picnic shelters Monday Friday

TRAILS AND PARKS MILLAGE

In November 2014, and again in March 2020, Ingham County voters approved a 0.5-mil, six-year levy for Ingham County Trails and Parks to fund trail and park projects across the County.

The overall goal of the Trails and Parks Millage Fund is to create and maintain a sustainable countywide system of independent recreation trails and adjacent parks within Ingham County. The millage provides approximately \$4 million per year.

With the initial passage of the millage, the County's Trail and Park Task Force completed the Trails and Parks Comprehensive Report. The plan identifies all the existing and proposed trails and

identifies regional priority corridors. As part of the plan development, all land trail pavement and bridges were inventoried and evaluated, and all water trails were identified, inventoried, and evaluated. The report also proposed millage allocation categories of new construction, repair, rehabilitation, long-term maintenance, or special project.

The plan suggested 5-10% of millage funds be allocated to Ingham County Parks. In March of 2016, the Ingham County Board of Commissioners approved an 8% County Parks allocation. The remaining millage funds are dispersed through a grant application process to trail and park projects to all the communities within the County.

ADDITIONAL RELATIONSHIPS

Ingham County Parks partners with a number of local communities, school districts, and agencies involved in parks and recreation. Through the trails millage described previously, the County will be working with the other jurisdictions in the County to provide the funding for trail improvements. Several school districts in the County hold cross country running events at the parks. Project Lakewell, a non-profit living history outdoor classroom, holds programs at Lake Lansing South and the Lake Lansing Boat Launch.

Ingham County staffers rely on the National and Michigan Recreation and Park Associations (NRPA and mParks) for resources and training. The Greater Lansing Convention and Visitors Bureau provides Certified Tourism Ambassador (CTA) training for County staffers.


OTHER RELATIONSHIPS

Ingham County owns approximately 100 acres at the County Medical Facility property in Meridian Township, with about ¾ of the property being undeveloped and natural. Currently Meridian Township has an agreement with Consumers Energy, along their power line south of this property, for a butterfly path on that property. Meridian Township has expressed interest in expanding this agreement, in the future, to include more public recreation opportunities on the undeveloped natural areas of this property.



PARKS & RECREATION INVENTORY

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OVERVIEW

This section of the Plan studies the available recreation facilities in Ingham County with a primary focus on County owned and / or operated facilities. Below you can also find the recreation programs offered at Ingham County Parks.

Other public parks and recreation facilities that are of regional importance are listed as well. Please note that the major focus of this inventory is park facilities. While some trails and non-motorized paths are mentioned, a complete inventory of those facilities, across the County can be found in the Ingham County Trails and Parks Comprehensive Report.


INGHAM COUNTY PARK FACILITIES

This section of the Plan studies the available recreation facilities in Ingham County, with a primary focus on County-owned and / or operated facilities.

This recreation inventory was originally conducted by Ingham County Parks Department (ICPD). Acreage was determined through existing park maps and legal descriptions. The inventory was updated as of September 2021 by the planning consultants and verified by County staff. Ingham County has three park management units. Each has a manger overseeing the unit. The park management units are as follows:

- William M. Burchfield (including Burchfield Parks, Riverbend Natural Area, McNamara Landing & Bunker Road Landing)
- Hawk Island (including Hawk Island Park & Soldan Dog Park)
- Lake Lansing: (including Lake Lansing North, Boat Launch, and Lake Lansing South)





ADA ACCESSIBILITY ASSESSMENT

Creating a park system that is safe, accessible, and usable to all individuals, including those with disabilities, is essential. A grading system has been developed by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to easily identify those parks and facilities which are most and least accessible, based on the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) guidelines. The accessibility grading system uses a five-point system ranging from one (none of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines), to five (the entire park was developed/renovated using the principals of universal design). See Table 5 for the grading system; The Score of each Ingham County Park facilities can be found on pages 42-47.

A thorough ADA compliance assessment of Ingham County parks was conducted by the planning consultant in 2016 and updated in the summer of 2021. The assessment consisted of a visual inspection of each park in regard to access and circulation in each park facility. Ingham County is dedicated to continuing its efforts towards improving accessibility at each of its parks when improvements are made. This includes accessible parking, paths, restrooms, activity areas, amenities, and signage.

In 2020, the County Trails and Parks Millage (\$300,000) and CIP (\$115,600) funded improvements to the boat launch which include re-construction of the boat launch and skid pier, a new boat washing station, a new electronic entrance gate, a new park entry sign, a kiosk, a pump station, riprap along the shoreline and new fencing: construction is estimated to be completed in 2022.

In 2021, DNR grants (Phase 2: LWCF (LW21-0025, \$500,000) and TF (Phase 1: TF21-0057, \$300,000) were submitted, matched with Trails and Parks Millage for the local match (LW \$500,000, TF \$281,500); will fund a crushed stone path along 1.7 miles of existing trail, including replacement of 5 boardwalks (LWCF-1.5 miles (4 boardwalks); TF-0.2 miles (1 boardwalk)), new fitness stations, interpretive signage, mile markers and benches, rain gardens, a new entry sign and new electric entry gate; grant award is estimated December 2021. Along with existing paved walkways in the park, this would provide approximately 20% of the trails as ADA accessible.



In 2019, DNR grants (LWCF (26-01820, \$300,000) and TF (TF19-0114, \$300,000) were awarded, matched with Trails and Parks Millage for the local match (LW \$300,000, TF \$725,200); will fund (LWCF) paving of the existing gravel parking lot (10 ADA spaces only), drainage improvements, improvements to the overflow parking area (with additional paved ADA parking), new walkways through the park (TF) a new bathhouse (removal of old building) with restrooms, changing rooms, concessions and storage, relocation of the Sunrise shelter, and new walkways, picnic tables, interpretive signs and outdoor showers; construction is estimated to be completed in 2022.

In 2020, the Trails and Parks Millage (\$125,000) funded new fencing, gates, a boulder barrier, an employee parking area, an area for the weed harvester to access the lake and some new walkways; construction is estimated to be completed in 2022.

In 2020, a DNR grant (TF (TF20-0039) was awarded, matched with Trails and Parks Millage for the local match (\$330,200); will fund a new accessible canoe/kayak launch, paving of the existing gravel main parking lot (2 additional ADA spaces), drainage improvements around the parking lot, and new walkways through the park; construction is estimated to be completed in 2023.

In 2019, DNR grants (LWCF (26-01823, \$292,100) and TF (TF19-0116, \$300,000) were awarded, matched with Trails and Parks Millage for the local match (LW \$292,100, TF \$231,400); will fund (LWCF) new walkways, replacement of the pedal boat dock, an ADA canoe/kayak launch, striping of the ADA parking spaces, (2) new shade shelters, picnic tables, benches, grills, trash bins, signage, native landscaping and fencing, (TF) new walkways, new fishing piers, striping of the loop path, striping ADA parking spaces, benches, trash bins signage and native landscaping; construction is estimated to be completed in 2022.

In 2020, the Trails and Parks Millage (\$200,000) funded the engineering for replacement of the docks around the pond; construction is estimated to be completed in 2023 (phase 1 and 2) and 2024/5 (phase 3).

In 2020, a DNR grant (TF (TF20-0039, \$300,000) was awarded, matched with Trails and Parks Millage for the local match (\$330,200); will fund a new accessible canoe/kayak launch, paving of the existing gravel main parking lot (2 additional ADA spaces), drainage improvements around the parking lot, and new walkways through the park; construction is estimated to be completed in 2023.

OTHER INGHAM COUNTY OPERATED RECREATION FACILITIES

POTTER PARK AND POTTER PARK ZOO

NOT OPERATED BY INGHAM COUNTY PARKS DEPARTMENT

Potter Park Zoo is owned by the City of Lansing and operated and maintained by Ingham County. In November 2006, Ingham County voters approved a millage that transferred the operation and maintenance of Potter Park and Potter Park Zoo from the City of Lansing to Ingham County. Ingham County assumed operations on July 1, 2007. The Zoo Millage, passed in March 2020, increased to 0.5 mils (previously 0.41 mils). The millage funds the Park and Zoo through June of 2027. The millage and earned revenues at the Park and Zoo constitute the budget for the Park and Zoo property. There is no County appropriation for the Park or Zoo.

For daily operational policy and procedural issues, the Potter Park Zoo Director reports to the Deputy County Controller. The Potter Park Zoo Board recommends policies and procedures related to the day-to-day operation of the Zoo and Park consistent with Ingham County policy. The Ingham County Board of Commissioners has oversight of the Zoo, appoints the Zoo Board members, and approves any contracts, resolutions regarding significant matters, and the annual budget.

Potter Park and Potter Park Zoo is located five minutes from downtown Lansing. The 105-acre facility includes the zoo, playgrounds, picnic grounds and shelters, snack bar, riverbank fishing, and access to the Lansing River Trail. The Zoo attracts around 185,000 visitors annually, and 58,500 students per year. The Zoo is open 364 days a year offering special events like Zoo nights, and a casual happy hour. The Red Cedar River serves as the southern perimeter of the Park and Zoo property.

OTHER PUBLIC PARK LANDS IN INGHAM COUNTY

Nearly all the communities within Ingham County have their own park and recreation facilities. Most of these can be considered local parks that fulfill the need for close-to-home recreation and open space. The County has five communities that have parks or recreation facilities which are considered to have a significant regional impact. Four of these communities have the largest population in Ingham County: City of East Lansing, the City of Lansing, Delhi Charter Township, Meridian Charter Township. Other significant public lands in Ingham County include the City of Williamston, Michigan State University, the Dansville State Game Area, and the Meridian Baseline Historic State Park.

CITY OF EAST LANSING

The City of East Lansing has 34 parks and two community centers, totaling 490-acres of public park and recreation facilities. The Aquatic Center which includes a large multi-use pool and water park is a great regional facility. Abbot Road Park is a 130-acre wooded facility that includes nature and cross-county ski trails and the Hannah Community Center. The Northern Tier Trail system provides 4.8 miles of recreation trails that connects with an additional 13.2 miles of existing bike lanes along East Lansing streets, Michigan State University and the Lansing River Trail.

CITY OF LANSING

The City of Lansing owns 109 parks covering approximately 1,900 acres. The 134-acre Fenner Nature Center operated by the Fenner Conservancy, is an environmental education center that includes over four miles of hiking trails and holds regional significance. Another large Lansing park with regional significance is Crego Park, a 200-acre wooded, natural area and frontage on the Red Cedar River with an accessible canoe / kayak launch.

Lastly, the Lansing River Trail is another regionally significant recreation opportunity. It includes 20 miles of paved trails that pass through numerous park and natural areas, as well as downtown Lansing. It traverses through Hawk Island County Park and connects to the Delhi Township trail system.

DELHI CHARTER TOWNSHIP

Delhi Township is located immediately south of the City of Lansing and includes the unincorporated area of Holt. The Township has seven small neighborhood or community parks. The largest park is Valhalla Park (63.01 acres) which draws visitors from across the County. The Park has a beach located on a small inland lake. The Delhi Township trail system is an important recreational system that connects to the Lansing River Trail, Hawk Island County Park, and the City of Mason.

MERIDIAN CHARTER TOWNSHIP

Meridian Township is located immediately east of East Lansing. A great deal of growth has occurred in this Township within the last 25 years, prompting the Township to take a serious approach to park land acquisition and protection.

Meridian Township's Park system consists of over 900 acres of land across 29 sites, including two large community parks: Central Park (243 acres) and Meridian Riverfront Park (204 acres). A special feature of Central Park is the Historical Village. Five historic buildings from the region have been relocated to the Village since 1973. The Village hosts two holiday events in July and December and is open to the public every Saturday, July through September. Central Park also offers various sports fields, hiking trails, a nature area, fishing lake, picnicking, and an open space play area.

Meridian Riverfront Park is comprised of Legg Park, Harris Nature Center and Eastgate Park. Due to its adjacency to the Red Cedar River, the Meridian Riverfront Park area has the potential for river recreation corridor linkage. This Park area has canoeing, a nature area, interpretive center, and trails. The Township has other smaller parks ranging in size from 1 to 70 acres. These parks offer areas for nature-based recreation as well as sports. Ferguson and Wonch Parks on Okemos Road are other parks in Meridian Township that have regional significance serving as launch sites for the Red Cedar Water Trail.

Meridian Townships in the process of constructing the MSU to Lake Lansing Trail which will connect to Michigan State University at Hagadorn Road and to Lake Lansing Parks North and South through multiple phases.

CITY OF WILLIAMSTON

The City of Williamston has several small neighborhood and community parks totaling 37 acres. Memorial Park (9.8 acres), McCormick Park (7.21 acres), and Old Mill Park (less than 1 acre), provides regional significance with their access to the Red Cedar River. McCormick Park serves as the trailhead for the Red Cedar Water Trail which travels westward to the confluence of the Grand River in downtown Lansing.

MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY

Michigan State University (MSU) is located in East Lansing and is 5,150 acres in size. Its athletic facilities support everything from Big Ten sports teams to youth camps and competitions, utilizing both outdoor and indoor facilities.

MSU's outdoor athletic facilities include the Spartan Football Stadium and practice field, soccer fields, running track, baseball fields, two 18-hole golf courses at Forest Akers, intramural athletic fields, 40 tennis courts, platform tennis, volleyball, and canoeing. MSU's indoor facilities satisfy many of the regional demands including swimming, racquetball, basketball, ice skating, hockey, weightlifting, and running track. MSU also has garden facilities including Beal Gardens, the Horticulture Gardens, and the Lewis Landscape Arboretum.

In addition, Baker Woodlot, Sanford Natural Area, Beal Pinetum, and Red Cedar Natural Area provide some trails and beneficial green buffers. Culturally, MSU offers Abrams Planetarium and the MSU Museum. There are also several locations for plays and concert events, including the Wharton Center for Performing Arts and the MSU Auditorium. Several other smaller facilities on campus support these types of performance events. Large events are also held at the Breslin Student Events Center, Jenison Fieldhouse, and Munn Ice Arena.

Multiple points in campus connect to the Lansing River Trail, the Northern Tier Trail and the Madeiran Township System Trail.

STATE LANDS IN INGHAM COUNTY

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) owns approximately 5,000 acres of land within Ingham County. These include two state game areas and a historic state park:

- Grand River Gale Road State Game Area 131 acres, boat launch, popular fishing spot.
- **Dansville State Game Area** 4,800 acres, primarily for hunting and wildlife conservation, includes shooting range, not all areas accessible to the public.
- Meridian Baseline State Historic Park 108 acres, unique park that designates the location where all township, range and section measurements begin for the entire state of Michigan. Preserved for its historic value.

These facilities add to the range of regional recreation opportunities available in Ingham County.

REGIONAL PARK FACILITIES SURROUNDING INGHAM COUNTY

Ingham County is surrounded by the following Counties: Eaton, Clinton, Shiawassee, Livingston, and Jackson. Significant regional recreation facilities are listed below:

EATON COUNTY

- **Fitzgerald Park:** 78 acres in Grand Ledge, located on the Grand River. Fitzgerald Park offers trails for hiking and cross-country skiing, a nature center, two picnic areas, four pavilions, a fishing ladder, canoe landing and rentals, a playground, a sledding hill, and sports facilities. The park is home to The Ledges, an ancient sedimentary rock outcropping lining the banks of the Grand River.
- Oak Park: 7 acres in the City of Grand Ledge, featuring the Ledges of Grand River, a very popular rock-climbing spot in the Greater Lansing Region.
- Fox Memorial Park: 160 acres in Potterville, includes a picnic area with three pavilions, playground, volleyball, gravel pit swimming, fishing, trails, and an observatory.
- Woldumar Nature Center: 188 acres of privately owned land, operated as a not-for-profit organization. Located just west of Lansing in Delta Township, Woldumar is open to the public year-round. The nature area is dedicated for the preservation and education of the natural environment. The Nature Center encompasses a variety of ecosystems, including wetlands, a river, a mature maple-beach forest, pine forest plantation, successive farm communities, and wildflowers. Five miles of foot trails, with cross-country skiing opportunities during the winter, which are all open to the public from dawn to dusk. Programs include several options for day camps during the summer, educational field trips during the school year, and family-oriented programs on the weekends.

CLINTON COUNTY

- Clinton Lakes County Park: 272 acres north of St Johns. The Park includes two lakes (90 acres and 12 acres) with fishing, hunting, swimming, beach activity, a dog beach, hiking, canoe, and kayak use.
- Motz County Park: 42 acres north of St. Johns. The park features a 15-acre lake, fishing, swimming, boating, and picnic areas.
- Rose Lake Wildlife Research Area: 3,500 acres in Clinton and Shiawassee Counties. Rose
 Lake is located in the northwest corner of the County, 8 miles northeast of East Lansing.

 Rose Lake offers 15 miles of hiking, horseback riding, a shooting range, hunting and fishing.
- Sleepy Hollow State Park: 2,678 acres located southeast of St. Johns in Clinton County, with modern camping and a rustic campground, swimming, fishing pier, hunting, 16 miles of non-motorized trails, 3 picnic areas, a half mile beach, and a boat launch.
- Maple River State Game Area: 11,000 acres located in the northwest corner of the County. It
 is a linear park along the Maple River. Its primary recreation use is boating for canoes and
 other small boats as well as fishing.

JACKSON COUNTY

- Waterloo State Recreation Area: At 20,000 acres, this is the largest State Park in lower Michigan, approximately 20 miles southeast of Mason, and portions are located in Washtenaw County. Park opportunities include camping, fishing, hiking, biking, cross country skiing, snow mobiles, boating, swimming, and horseback riding.
- Sharonville State Game Area: 4,337 acres located southeast of Jackson with a shooting range, archery range, and hunting areas.

LIVINGSTON COUNTY

- **Pinckney**: 11,000 acres of State Recreation Park. The Park features rustic camping, swimming, boating, hiking, picnicking, hunting, and fishing opportunities.
- **Brighton**: 4,947 acres of State Recreation Park, featuring rustic camping, swimming, boating, hiking, picnicking, hunting, horseback riding, and fishing opportunities.
- **Island Lake:** 4,000 acres of large State Recreation Park. The Park provides camping, swimming, boating, hiking, picnicking, hunting, and fishing opportunities.
- Gregory State Game Area: 3,400 acres.
- Unadilla Wildlife Area: 700 acres, southwest corner of Livingston County between Pinckney and Stockbridge. Primarily offer hunting and fishing, with some hiking trails.
- Oak Grove State Game Area: 2,000 acres approximately 18 miles east of Williamston, hunting and fishing opportunities are available for park visitors.

INGHAM COUNTY RECREATION PROGRAMMING

Ingham County hosts a wide variety of recreation programs annually. Most are planned and organized by other groups and agencies who use the parks facilities to host their events. Many of the programs offered in the Ingham County parks can be considered special events that are typically offered on an annual basis.

INGHAM COUNTY PARKS GRANT HISTORY

Ingham County has received numerous grants from the DNR since 1973. Post competition self-certification reports for each were updated and filed with the DNR in 2021. All land funded by acquisition grants are currently usable park space and all grant assisted development projects are in use. The grant history proved by the DNR is in Appendix B.





OVERVIEW

Public input provides a framework and basis for parks and recreation goals and objectives while helping community leaders determine the needs of residents. To comply with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources Guidelines for the Development of Community Parks and Recreation Plan. Ingham County offered several types of public input opportunities which included open houses, an online input survey, and a 30-day public review period for comments on the draft plan.

A compilation of all the input receive is contained in Appendix C. A summary of the various methods of input and feedback received is described in the following pages.

The Plan was provided during the required 30-day public review period held between Month and Months, 2021 and concluding with a public hearing and adoption by the Ingham County Board of Commissioners on Month, 2021.

PUBLIC INPUT OPPORTUNITIES

OPEN HOUSE MEETINGS

Ingham County Parks Department hosted three open house meetings, the first on July 20th at Lake Lansing Park South, the second on July 22nd at Burchfield Park, and the third on July 26th at Hawk Island Park. The meetings were publicized with the online survey information. Residents were invited to attend and discuss parks and recreation issues important to them. Attendance at the open house meetings was less than five people at each meeting site. See Appendix C for a complete listing of the input taken at the Open House meetings.

COMMUNITY INPUT SURVEY

In June of 2021, an online input survey was prepared to gather input regarding parks and recreation in Ingham County. The online survey included 20 questions regarding public parks, trails, and recreational facilities, natural features, and recreational opportunities in Ingham County. Ingham County received 2,200 responses from residents of all the Ingham County communities and other park users interested in providing input. The survey was assigned the web domain www.lnghamCountyParkSurvey.com and users could also be linked to the survey via a QR code, by visiting the Ingham County website or Facebook page. The County completed an extensive publicity campaign to encourage people to take the survey. Specific initiatives included:

- E-mail to Mailing List (10,169 individuals)
- Five Posts on Ingham County Parks Department Facebook Page (13,755 followers)
- Link to survey on Ingham County Parks website
- E-mail to 1,000 Ingham County Employees
- 10,000 postcards printed that were handed out at parks, given to parks commissioners, displayed at the clerk's office in the courthouse and Playmakers
- Survey flyers displayed at County Parks, Hilliard Building, and the County Courthouse
- Press release distributed to 85 media outlets and public agencies on 7/8/21

ABOUT THE SURVEY RESPONDENTS

At the end of the survey, respondents were asked to provide their zip code and age to provide an understanding of who provided input in the survey.

Respondents listed 50 different zip codes when ask for their home location. Table 16 depicts where the survey respondents live. The most request responses came from the Tri-County region of Ingham, Eaton, and Clinton counties. The top 15 zip codes are listed below



FIGURE 2 - PARK USAGE FREQUENCY





The respondents were asked if they use the Ingham County trail system to commute. 2.2% said they use the trail for their commute. If respondent answered yes, they were then asked the distance of their commute. Figure 3 below shows the breakdown of these responses. Over 50% commute 1-5 miles on the trail system. A quarter commute 5-10 miles and almost 20% commute over 10 miles.





NON-MOTORIZED & WATER TRAILS

To understanding if respondent think there are enough trail heads in Ingham County, Question 13 asked respondents if there are adequate trailhead sites as well as access points to the trail systems. The break down is below.

There were 132 responses to "no, please explain option". The top three responses were additional access points, more / better parking, and better signage.

Question 14 asked respondents should the County prioritize the development of the Red Cedar River Water Trail over the next five years. This would include clearing obstructions to create a navigable waterway, launch sites, and wayfinding signage? Majority of respondents said yes.

OVERVIEW

The information obtained from the online survey and other forms of feedback from park staff, users, area residents and the Parks and Recreation Commission laid the foundation for the goals and objectives of this Parks and Recreation Master Plan. The ICPD and the Parks and Recreation Commission will use these goals and objectives as decision-making guidelines during the next five vears.

GOAL 1: MAINTAIN AND IMPROVE EXISTING PARK LAND, FACILITIES, AND FEATURES

GOAL 2: ENSURE INGHAM COUNTY PARKS REMAIN SAFE, CLEAN, AND AVAILABLE TO ALL AREA **RESIDENTS**

Objective 2a: Collaborate with the Ingham County Sheriff's Office to provide patrol at parks.

Objective 2b: Continue to make parks available to all area residents through the hardship of "free" parking pass program.

GOAL 3: WORK TO IMPROVE PARK ACCESSIBILITY FOR VISITORS OF ALL AGES AND ABILITIES

GOAL 4: ENHANCE EXISTING TRAILS AND BLUEWAYS, AND DEVELOP NEW MULTI-USE TRAILS AND BLUEWAYS, THAT CONNECT PARKS WITH RECREATIONAL, RESIDENTIAL, CULTURAL, AND BUSINESS CENTERS THROUGHOUT INGHAM COUNTY.

Objective 4a: Develop trails as they are prioritized in the Trails & Parks Comprehensive Report

OVERVIEW

Ingham County has developed the following five-year action plan that will enable the Parks Department to move toward accomplishing its goals and objectives. The action plan details the direction that Ingham County Parks wishes to take over the next five years and beyond. It is developed to maintain and improve the quality and diversity of park and recreation opportunities in the Ingham County system.

It is important to note the projects and equipment lists below may not be exhaustive. The project list reflects the results of the input received from Ingham County Park staff, the open houses, and the online survey, and is the best reflection of needs at the time this plan was written. Future circumstances, especially availability of funding, may influence the order in which the projects are completed. Other projects may arise that were not able to be anticipated when the plan was written. This action portion of the Plan is intended to be reviewed annually by the Parks Departments staff and the Park Commission and be updated as needed, as part of the normal budget process.

MAJOR CAPITAL PROJECTS

Ingham County has identified major capital projects, which are shown in Table 21. These projects will require professional services assistance for planning, grant writing, design, and construction oversight, and will most likely need to be funded with a dedicated campaign that will include grant funding, millage proceeds, and fundraising. The projects have been prioritized and given a timeline so that the Ingham County Parks Department can look ahead and plan for the orderly development of these facilities. Each project is referenced to a specific goal from the previous section of this document.

CHAPTER 7 Process 75 Review and Adoption 75 PLANNING **PROCESS**

PROCESS

In a continuing effort to provide quality recreational opportunities for its citizens, Ingham County has developed this Plan as a tool to guide the development of community park and recreational facilities over the next five years. This plan is an update of the County's most recent plan which was adopted in 2017. The plan will provide the County eligibility for grants from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to assist the community in reaching its recreational goals.

Ingham County contracted with Spicer Group of Saginaw, Michigan to assist them with completion of the Parks and Recreation Plan. The consultant met with the Parks Director and staff several times during the development of the plan. The consultant attended three Ingham County Parks Commission open houses to provide updates and receive input. The consultant visited all of the parks to complete accessibility assessments and meet with park staff regarding needs at each park.

During the development of the plan four opportunities for input, participation and review were provided:

- On-line community input survey that was available from July 2 to August 9, 2021
- Park open houses hosted at three different parks on July 20,22, & 26, 2021
- 30-day review period

The plan was also discussed at several Parks Commission meetings between August and December of 2021

Based upon the existing information and the public input, the County developed goals and objectives for parks and recreation in Ingham County for the next five years. The County then planned for an action program to accomplish the goals and objectives of the plan.

REVIEW AND ADOPTION

A draft Plan was completed and available for the required 30-day review on the Ingham County Parks website and a hard copy available at Ingham County Park Office. The review period from Month, 2021 to Month, 2021 was publicized on the County's website, and Facebook page, and x. The final opportunity for community input occurred at the advertised public hearing held prior to adoption of this Plan, which was held on Month, 2021. After this public hearing, the Parks and Recreation Commission passed a motion recommending the County Board of Commissioners adopt the Plan. Finally, the Ingham County Board of Commissioners passed a resolution to adopt the Parks and Recreation Plan on Month, 2021.

Copies of the Plan were transmitted to Ingham County, and the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission. The Plan was uploaded to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for approval in Month, Year. Copies of the noticed advertisement, the public hearing minutes, and the resolution are included in Appendix D.

1. Introduction:

As a Marketing Coordinator and Social Media Intern I did a 4 month internship (10 May-September 10, 2021) at Ingham County Parks at Lake Lansing Park South where I did work for the Lake Lansing Community Bandshell. I started out making our social media presence increase in Facebook for Ingham County Parks, Lake Lansing Bandshell, and Lake Lansing Community Bandshell. My main duty was to help advertise, market and social media presence in assisting implementing strategies on how to better the 2021 Bandshell "Sounds of Summer" Friday Night concert series.

I started out my internship with no clue on what to do because I didn't want to mess up the posts and wording, but I started experimenting and figuring out what to post like the dates, time and engaging with the people on all of the social media platforms. My main duty was to ensure that everything for the concerts on Fridays goes well and have everything set up to make the bands, sponsors, and the audience happy. I would gather data of how much revenue we would get from the sponsors like their contribution which was \$6900, Red Can total was \$4499, 50/50 total raised was \$3494, 50/50 Deposit was \$1748, and the total attendance from June to August was 4820. The total band cost was \$9100 for all 13 bands. Overall, it was a much better summer than last year's Bandshell because they didn't have it last year due to the outbreak of the virus.

2. TASKS / DAILY ACTIVITIES

Most of my daily tasks could be divided into the following categories:

- Created events and social media posts on Facebook for the Lake Lansing Bandshell, Lake Lansing Community Bandshell, and Ingham County Parks and engaged with people on Facebook mostly if they enjoyed it, had questions or stated what they want in this year's Bandshell concert series for 2021. Making new social media pages such as Instagram, Youtube, and Tik Tok which were new scenarios to me, but once I got the hang of it I knew what to do.
- Creating and getting my materials from ASAP Printing where we worked closely together like materials I had to update and re-energize the programs (brochures) for the logo, bio for the band, band's information, sponsorship as well, and update new pricing as well for the sponsorship tiers where I'm continue getting information from other local parks. I would pick up the materials on a weekly basis from June to August. I updated and created sponsorship banners for new sponsors we got if their logo changed or anything else in general. I also created posters for the bands that played every Friday from June to August where one of the bands liked it where they wanted to keep it, but I just gave them the information! I would pick them up every week.
- I was working with Dave, our accountant, to make sure that bills were paid on time for the things we purchased like a Drone video, editing video, bills for the things we bought from ASAP, 50/50 deposits, and etc. We would seek out new sponsorships, but in the end we got around 19 sponsorships in total where we could have got more, but some of them did not contact me and weren't interested. We had around 3 and a half rainouts. It kind of hurt us in the Red Can and 50/50 raffle money which made the revenue decrease sadly, but in the end we did better! I would drop those things at his house as well.
- One of my other tasks was to develop the new Band Shell Brand such as making all of the sponsorships in one banner where it had all of the 2021 sponsors included in the banner which was cool. I also made a banner which said "Lake Lansing Bandshell" with Haslett, MI underneath in the middle of the stage, but I made half sheet flyers where I advertised and posted it around the park. In the future, I was trying to make a metal sign that included the Lake Lansing Bandshell on top of the pavilion so we had more attention and attraction towards it, but Coe and Aengus will work on that unfortunately.
- Photography and video recording where I took photos of the band, audience, staff members which helped grow the pages a lot and I just took them on my phone where I had a camera, but I didn't know what to do with it so hopefully the future intern knows what to do with that!
- Emails and phone calls. In my first week, me and my coworker Hannah went to local businesses and told them about sponsorship opportunities. Email and phone calls were

the best choices to see if they were interested in sponsoring for one of our events. I would contact the sponsors if they wanted to set up a table, two chairs, if they needed anything else for the sponsor tent, see if the bio on the programs were right for sponsors and as well as their logos, website info and so on. I would coordinate with weekly sponsors to see if they wish to have advertising in programs and as well as the bands with them opening and main acts to get their bios and pictures or what they want to include in the posters and programs. I Communicated with Coe and Aengus to get help if I needed something for the internship. We would coordinate weekly meetings which actually helped a lot whether it was in person or Zoom it helped tremendously!

- Helped assist staff with park operations just by helping them with whatever duties they had and stayed late on Fridays because I wanted to help them out. Helping out with the signs, A frame, putting up the posters up every week, changing the sponsor banners every week, inflatables, putting the chairs up at the front and so on. I also organized the Bandshell stage after it was over and hopefully I made it cleaner as well.
- Made signs for Magnets, programs, and Lake Lansing Park History books where it was easier for people to grab them then handing them out. Brung the Red Cans, cooler with water in it for the bands, 50/50 raffle tickets, vests, and bags, money box for the concessions, recording the Bandshell concerts/live streaming the event too, and making sure the bandshell concerts goes well. I would give the checks to the bands to make sure they were paid and to ensure if they need anything else before the concert starts.
- Helped out with the Red Can and update themes/bios for the bands on the programs, social media, and posters as well.
- Concierge/liaison for sponsors if in attendance and incorporated sponsors into performance nights.
- Develop weekly programs for bio's and sponsors- updating them if necessary.
- Helped track attendance and account for all revenue data of bandshell nights where Coe and Ian were a lot of help to this in components of sponsor contribution, Red Can, 50/50 Total, 50/50 Deposits, Winning numbers, and the total number of people in attendance.
- Putting information about recruiting new members for the Bandshell Committee on Social Media platforms and on the back of the programs as well.
- Updating the social media pages and website for Ingham County Parks and Bandshell.
- Assist with Park Revenue.
- Coordinating with Aengus and Coe if there were concerns in anything with the Bandshell.
- Other duties were accomplished.

3. SUPERVISION

My supervisors and manager, Coe Emens is the head of Lake Lansing Park South and Aengus McIntosh is the President of The Friends of Ingham County Parks and Chair, Lake Lansing Bandshell Committee which are the major factors for the "Sounds of Summer" 2021 Friday Night concert series. They have been working at their positions for many years now. I consider myself lucky to have them as my supervisors and manager, since they would always find time for my questions and be willing to help. In addition, there were two more people who played important roles during my internship – Zachary Shafer, the Park Ranger, and Ian Londo, Assistant Park Manager where they were major factors in helping me throughout this internship and they helped me learn new things not at work, but in life as well. Finally, I cannot skip the fact that all my coworkers are very nice people and they all contributed towards the ambience at work and who made me feel welcomed from the very first day of my internship. Everyone was truly the best people to work with and I appreciate the opportunity that Coe has given me and it means a lot to me having this internship as well!




The total social media posts that I have created is around 23 posts for the total amount of posts for Facebook, Twitter and etc.

From May 10 to September 3, 2021 it has a total comments of 94, total shares was 110, and 1290 click links on the posts.








Total views for the LLCBS page.



I have created the page prior to 2 or 3 weeks just posting videos and it has about 8 followers and it has a total of 53 likes and a total of 3006 views on the page.




Youtube Page for Ingham County Parks:

Secondly, I got acquainted with functions and responsibilities of the payments, slips, deposits, checks and etc for the Bandshell in general, and of course, got highly involved in the daily life of our park. I had to learn some things that I didn't know where I had to research and figure it out by myself which was hard, but once I learned how to do something it got better I would say. I also got an insight into the strengths of the parks and the Bandshell, as well as its weaknesses and the need for improvement. On the other hand, I would say this internship was great. It had pros and cons where I had to do things out of my comfort zone. I would ask questions to where sometimes I didn't know how to do something, but I would ask Coe, Aengus, Zach, Kelly, Eric, Nicole, Ian and the other staff members which made my internship a lot better because I didn't want to mess up in any sense. Downed Trees

If you haven't met me, I'm Ashley Thompson, a student at The University of Michigan and the Management Intern for Burchfield Park this past summer. At the university's School of Information, I study User Experience/Interaction Design and more specifically the interaction between people and technology. As a Management Intern at Burchfield Park, I had the opportunity of participating in a wide range of projects and even created my own personal project. I spent much of my time assisting Tim and Chris in managing projects and advocating for the seasonals. When I wasn't mowing or carrying kayaks to our landings, you could find me at my desk, working on something new to remind the park visitors of what Burchfield is all about.

Interpretative signage can be found at most major parks, denoting their history or their natural features. It's something I thought a park as grand as Burchfield might be missing. So I went digging through boxes of photos and documents that most of the current park staff has never seen. I started by piecing together the history of Burchfield using land purchases and letters from the 70s. I later met with Bob Moore to confirm what I had learned and hear about his role in the creation of the park. Through all of this, I learned Burchfield began in 1936 as a gravel pit for the road commission in what we now call Bigfoot Lake. But it wasn't until the 1970s, when Bob Moore was hired, that Burchfield really began taking off as a county park. Land acquisition was a decade-long process but it wasn't long before Riverbend and Burchfield were staple parks in local visitors' lives.

Because this history felt so personal and the people walking the trails deserve to know where their experience is coming from, I felt compelled to turn this knowledge into interpretative signs. I created 3 signs in total, one for Burchfield main, one for Riverbend, and one for McNamara. Each sign features a brief history of that land, a bit about the natural landscape, and an interactive scavenger hunt for the visitors. The scavenger hunt features things like native plants you can spot walking along the trail, and remnants of the farms that used to occupy that park. I hope these signs will bridge the knowledge gap between those who started the park and those who walk the trails today. With only 50 years of time, there's a lot more history to be made and I hope we can always remember where Burchfield started and document the new memories families are making every day.

I grew a deep love for Burchfield Park in my last 3 years here and especially through this project. It's a special place and has been for generations of local residents. It's a place to be celebrated and preserved.

By this time next year, I hope you can walk the trails and read through my work on a crisp new sign. I ask that you take time to snap a photo of your family there and close your eyes to imagine what that spot looked like only 60 years ago.
